
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Research Design


- What are the feminist social movements in CEE today?
- How do the contemporary feminist movements challenge
 the emergence of anti-gendered politics?
- How do the feminist movements organize in their strategy building towards systematic change in Poland and in the CEE region at large?
- \rightarrow operationalised by analysing:
- Social movements as *a process* (Maeckelbergh 2017);
- Social movements as networked-based organizational forms (Juris 2004);
- Transnational networking practices;
- using:
- Ethnography of networks both on-site and digital as the main research methodology



Methodology: Multi-Sited Ethnography

Principles:

- 1. On-site "thick" study of activist cultures and their social life over prolonged period of time
- 2. Study of **multi-layered relationships** of various actors and processes within social movements
- 3. Main ethnographic methods: participant observation / in-depth interviews / digital ethnography / social network analysis
- 4. Engaged anthropology' (Gledhill 2000, Scheper-Hughes 1995, Walter 1995) → "participant comprehension" (Wood 1998)
- 5. Feminist research \rightarrow an embodied action proposal for social change (Montenegro, 20220

a broader struggle against right-wing populism – a stage of this struggle in which feminism strives to take


Transnational Networking Practices
